This year the knights provided over \$57, 800.00 in free Active Crisis Training to the Catholic Diocese of Monterey County, to the First Baptist Church in Salinas, Ca. and to the Community Church of Salinas.

As a result of our training we now have several documented testimonies of people who have used our Active Crisis Training to survive an Active Killer/Active Shooter Situation.

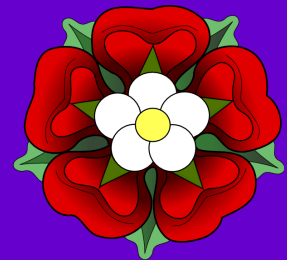
God Speed to the knights who continue to have the vigilance to make a difference with our communities and fight against evil.

2019 REPORT ON VOLUNTEER HOURS AND DONATIONS

As an organization we can be very proud of our continued community service, volunteer hours and donations. This past year our members contributed monthly donations of food to the Carmelite Monastery in Carmel, Ca. valued at \$150.00 per month for a total of \$1800.00 for the year. Members have also donated to our O.S.t.M.A.A. over \$2700.00 in Life Saving Recognitions, Valor Recognition to those in service and Posthumous Medal of Valor Recognition to those who died in the line of duty.

Our members tallied up the following Fraternal Activity for 2019: Caring for sick 189 hours, bereaved visits, 48 hours, 15 blood donors, 514 hours of church service, 2135 hours of community related volunteer services, 680 hours of volunteer service for youth activities, 1400 additional volunteer hours, \$3720.00 in donations on behalf of the Order to charitable or benevolent causes, 985 hours of fraternal service, 197 hours of volunteer service to our veterans, 2690 miles of volunteer travel on behalf of our veterans, \$2372.00 in donations towards veterans causes, 185 hours of volunteer service to First Responders, 2891 miles of volunteer travel on behalf of First Responders, 1121 hours towards school safety and On behalf of the Order of Saint Michael and the Knights of the Rose we THANK YOU!

ANDRE MAURICE MOYE, JR.

California Highway Patrol, California

EOW: Monday, August 12, 2019

Officer Andre Moye was shot and killed after conducting a traffic stop near the junction of I-215 and Eastridge Avenue in Riverside.

As Officer Moye completed paperwork to impound the vehicle the driver retrieved a rifle from it and opened fire. Despite being mortally wounded, Officer Moye was able to radio for assistance. Officers from the California Highway Patrol, Riverside Police Department, and Riverside County Sheriff’s Office responded to the scene and engaged the subject in a prolonged shootout. Two other officers were wounded and the subject was killed.

The subject who shot him was an active member of an outlaw motorcycle gang and had previously served 10 years in prison for attempted murder.

Officer Moye had served with the California Highway Patrol for 3-1/2 years and was assigned to the Riverside Area Office. He is survived by his wife, mother, father, and siblings.

NATALIE BECKY CORONA

Davis Police Department, California

EOW: Thursday, January 10, 2019

Police Officer Natalie Corona was shot and killed after responding to a report of a three-car vehicle crash near the intersection of 5th and D streets.

As Officer Corona was conducting an investigation at the collision scene, a person not involved with the crash rode up to the scene on a bicycle. As Officer Corona spoke to one of the persons involved in the crash the man then walked up to her and opened fire without warning, striking her. He shot her several more times after she fell to the ground before shooting randomly at others bystanders and vehicles.

The subject fled into a nearby home. As responding officers searched for him he emerged from the home wearing body armor, yelled at the officers, and then re-entered the home. He committed suicide moments later.

Officer Corona was transported to UC Davis Medical Center, where she died from her wounds.

Officer Corona started her career with the Davis Police Department in 2016 as a part-time volunteer Community Service Officer. In 2018 she attended the police academy, graduating in July 2018. She completed her field training three weeks prior to the incident. She is survived by her parents. Her father had recently

To where have we been called?

Our Communities' safety is an issue we need to confront. As an Order, we pray for and support all of our men and women of public safety and military commitments. Can we do more? A large number of our members have been involved in training issues for educators and church leaders around the issues of active shooter/killer events.

Last year we held our first Active Shooter Public Safety Conference. It was very well attended two-day conference in Salinas. All attendees praised the topics, speakers and demonstrations as very informative and practical. We are planning to offer another one next year and are working on expanding the topics.

We don't often think that we can make a difference by ourselves. As we dedicate ourselves as Knights and Dames of honor and duty, we must believe that the gifts we bring to the table, do indeed make a difference in someone's life. As an Order, we are mighty in prayer and talents. Let us never forget how God can use us to make a difference in places He chooses to call us to. We are the instruments and we respond as He calls. It is not often easy to understand our effectiveness in a crisis situation, but we trust that God will guide.

I am reminded of a story by a brand new military doctor on the front lines in Iraq. The medical room was right across from the chapel. She says, "I was fearful that I hadn't treated such cases as I had been told I would face, when the helicopter landed and my first patient was the most horrific situation I had ever faced. The soldier had multiple critical wounds. I knelt down and began shouting orders for supplies, pressure, bindings, I don't even know what I was saying but I know my hands were working faster than ever....and we were able to stabilize the soldier who later recovered from his near-fatal wounds. When I finished, I went into the chapel and began to cry. I told God that I didn't know what the heck I was doing, it was like someone else was moving my hands to do what was needed.....and a life was saved. I knew it was God who guided my hands, and I can't remember a think I did that day, but I did the right thing."

We must trust that God put us in a place to do something. Let us all keep that flame of faith and confidence alive in all we do.....and stay safe.
